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### Course Description

This course will provide an introduction to formulating and answering questions in the field of communication using social science research methods. Course topics will range from developing social scientific research questions and hypotheses to analyses of data. Psychology & Communication Department, College of Arts & Sciences

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### WIN-Designation

This course is designated as a writing-intensive (WIN) course. In this course, writing will not only be the subject of study, but it will also serve as a method of learning. Students will learn how communication in written, oral, and visual forms change according to purpose and genre. Brainstorming, drafting, revising, and peer-workshopping are integrated into the course curriculum and are the required components of this writing-intensive course. The final Research Paper is the designated assignment for WIN assessment.

**Reading Expectations.** Please come to class prepared with all assigned readings completed. Class lectures and discussions are organized to expand on concepts found in the readings. If you do not read, you will perform poorly on class assignments and exams.

**Writing Expectations.** I expect your writing to be clear and well-organized. Spelling, grammar, and punctuation count on all assignments. Any of these errors are problematic and cast serious doubt on the accuracy of the facts in your project. Multiple errors of this type will lower your grade.

**Research Expectations.** Please remember that websites often contain errors. Some of the most incisive and important information about campaigns can only be found in books and academic journals. It is recommended that you visit <https://www.tamui.edu/library/> to find out more information about how to utilize the resources available to you.

**Technology Expectations.** Please use technology purposefully and professionally in class. You are expected to refrain from browsing the internet, texting, listening to music, and talking on the phone when meeting synchronously in class.

### Attendance

Students should make every reasonable effort to attend all class meetings. However, if a student is unable to attend a class, it is the student's responsibility to inform the instructor as soon as possible and make up missed classwork within a reasonable amount of time. Attendance will be taken at the beginning of every class session. I understand that life happens; therefore, students are allowed two absences without penalty for any reason. After these two allowed absences, each unexcused absence will result in a 10-point deduction from your final grade. To have an absence excused, students must notify the instructor with a reasonable explanation before the start of class. ### Late Work Policy

Students are expected to submit all assignments on time. Late submissions will receive a 30% grade deduction after the assigned deadline. Work submitted more than three days past the deadline will not be accepted. Due to logistical challenges, late peer reviews will not be accepted under any circumstances. Additionally, midterm and final exams cannot be made up.

### AI Use

In this course, I encourage you to explore the use of artificial intelligence (AI) tools, such as ChatGPT, to facilitate the learning process and brainstorm research ideas, and Grammarly for checking grammar in all assignments. However, please note that the use of AI tools is strictly prohibited for the midterm and final exams.

Any use of AI tools must be appropriately acknowledged and cited according to the guidelines in the APA Style, including specifying the version of the tool used. However, you cannot simply copy and paste answers from AI. You must demonstrate the process of refining and improving AI-generated content. Submitted work must include a shareable link to the conversation and showing the exact prompt used to generate the content, as well as the complete AI response, which should be included as an appendix.

Because AI-generated content is not always accurate or appropriate, you must critically assess the validity and applicability of any AI-generated output included in your work. Full credit will not be granted if the submitted work contains inaccurate, invalid, or inappropriate information.

### Grade Discussions

I do not discuss grades or any student record issues via email or Blackboard messages. Please schedule a meeting with me to discuss these matters. If necessary, I may ask you to submit a written petition along with your work in question. The classroom is typically not an appropriate place for these discussions.

## Assignments and Points

### INDIVIDUAL GRADES (70% of final grade)

#### Attendance & Class Participation (8% of final grade)

Attendance is required, and in-class class discussions and questions are highly encouraged and appreciated. Students are allowed TWO absences without penalty for any reason (e.g., illness, missed bus, oversleeping). After these two allowed absences, each unexcused absence will result in a loss of 10 points from your final grade. To have an absence excused, students must notify the instructor with a reasonable explanation before the START of class.

#### CITI Training (2% of final grade)

This is a training program regarding social responsibility and ethics regarding human subjects research. Students need to complete the training and submit the certificate to Blackboard.

#### Exams (30% of final grade)

Students will complete one Midterm Exam (Mar 5th) and one Final Exam (May 12th). Each exam will feature a mix of T/F, multiple choice, short answer, and essay questions. Each exam is worth 150 points.

#### Final Proposal (30% of final grade)

For the final project, students will develop a research proposal on a topic of their choice within the field of communication. The proposal will consist of two main sections: Part I, which includes the introduction and literature review, and Part II, which focuses on the research methodology. The introduction should clearly outline the research problem, objectives, and the study's significance and implications. The literature review should summarize relevant studies, providing the necessary context and supporting the proposed research. The methodology section should detail the research design, sampling method, measurements, data collection procedures, and data analysis approach.

The proposal should be well-organized, demonstrate a clear understanding of the chosen research topic, and be supported by academic sources. All submissions must adhere to APA 7th edition style guidelines and be 6–9 pages in length, double-spaced, excluding the title and references pages. As part of this project, students will also deliver an in-class presentation of their final proposals during Week 15.

To help students stay on track, the final project is divided into seven steps, each with specific due date. Any late submissions will affect the project grade. This final research proposal is worth 300 points in total, with the points distributed across the following components:

- Step 1: Research Question (Due 2/5) – 20 pts
- Step 2: Final Proposal Part I – Literature Review Draft (Due 3/2) – 15 pts
- Step 3: Final Proposal Part I – Literature Review Peer Reviews (Due 3/9) – 5 pts
- Step 4: Final Proposal Part II – Methodology Draft (Due 4/20) – 15 pts
- Step 5: Final Proposal Part II – Methodology Peer Reviews (Due 4/27) – 5 pts
- Step 6: Final Proposal Presentation (4/28 & 4/30) – 60 pts
- Step 7: Final Proposal (Part I and II combined) (Due 5/4) – 180 pts

**GROUP GRADES (30% of final grade)**

**Research Article Critique (10% of final grade)**

For this assignment, students will select a peer-reviewed journal article in the field of communication that uses a quantitative research method. Students will summarize and analyze the article, using it as a case study to demonstrate how specific research methods are applied in communication research.

This assignment consists of two parts: a 15-minute in-class presentation and a written component. One week prior to the presentation, students must submit their selected article to the instructor for approval.

The presentation and written assignment should summarize the article research questions and key findings, explain how the literature review leads to these questions, describe the methodology used and its connection to answering the research questions, and evaluate the quality of the article.

**Survey Assignment (10% of final grade)**

This assignment consists of two parts. First, students will design a survey study using Qualtrics on a topic of their choice. Second, students will analyze a provided data set to practice their data analysis skills and report the results.

**Experiment Assignment (10% of final grade)**

This assignment consists of two parts. First, students will design an experimental study using Qualtrics on a topic of their choice. Second, students will analyze a provided data set to practice their data analysis skills and report the results.

### Required Class Attendance

Students are expected to attend every class in person (or virtually, if the class is online) and to complete all assignments. If you cannot attend class, it is your responsibility to communicate absences with your professors. The faculty member will decide if your excuse is valid and thus may provide lecture materials of the class. According to University policy, acceptable reasons for an absence, which cannot affect a student's grade, include:

- Participation in an authorized University activity.
- Death or major illness in a student's immediate family.
- Illness of a dependent family member.
- Participation in legal proceedings or administrative procedures that require a student's presence.
- Religious holy day.
- Illness that is too severe or contagious for the student to attend class.
- Required participation in military duties.
- Mandatory admission interviews for professional or graduate school which cannot be rescheduled.

Students are responsible for providing satisfactory evidence to faculty members within seven calendar days of their absence and return to class. They must substantiate the reason for the absence. If the absence is excused, faculty members must either provide students with the opportunity to make up the exam or other work missed, or provide a satisfactory alternative to complete the exam or other work missed within 30 calendar days from the date of absence. Students who miss class due to a University-sponsored activity are responsible for identifying their absences to their instructors with as much advance notice as possible.

## Classroom Behavior (applies to online or Face-to-Face Classes)

In the classroom, students are expected to listen attentively, participate respectfully, and adhere to established rules. Behavior that interferes with the class lecture may result in disciplinary action, ensuring a productive and respectful learning environment for everyone. ## TAMU Honor Code: Plagiarism and Cheating

As a TAMU student, you are bound by the TAMU Honor Code to conduct yourself ethically in all your activities as a TAMU student and to report violations of the Honor Code. Please read carefully the Student Handbook Article 7 and Article 10 available at Student Handbook (<https://www.tamtu.edu/handbook/index.shtml>).

We are committed to strict enforcement of the Honor Code. Violations of the Honor Code tend to involve claiming work that is not one's own, most commonly plagiarism in written assignments and any form of cheating on exams and other types of assignments.

Plagiarism is the presentation of someone else's work as your own. It occurs when you:

1. Borrow someone else's facts, ideas, or opinions and put them entirely in your own words. You must acknowledge that these thoughts are not your own by immediately citing the source in your paper. Failure to do this is plagiarism.
2. Borrow someone else's words (short phrases, clauses, or sentences), you must enclose the copied words in quotation marks as well as citing the source. Failure to do this is plagiarism.
3. Present someone else's paper or exam (stolen, borrowed, or bought) as your own. You have committed a clearly intentional form of intellectual theft and have put your academic future in jeopardy. This is the worst form of plagiarism.

Here is another explanation from the 2020, seventh edition of the Manual of The American Psychological Association (APA):

"Plagiarism is the act of presenting the words, idea, or images of another as your own; it denies authors or creators of content the credit they are due. Whether deliberate or unintentional, plagiarism violates ethical standards in scholarship" (p. 254). This same principle applies to the illicit use of AI.

**Plagiarism:** Researchers do not claim the words and ideas of another as their own; they give credit where credit is due. Quotations marks should be used to indicate the exact words of another. Each time you paraphrase another author (i.e., summarize a passage or rearrange the order of a sentence and change some of the words), you need to credit the source in the text. The key element of this principle is that authors do not present the work of another as if it were their own words. This can extend to ideas as well as written words. If authors model a study after one done by someone else, the originating author should be given credit. If the rationale for a study was suggested in the discussion section of someone else's article, the person should be given credit. Given the free exchange of ideas, which is very important for the health of intellectual discourse, authors may not know where an idea for a study originated. If authors do know, however, they should acknowledge the source; this includes personal communications (p. 11). For guidance on proper documentation, consult the Academic Success Center or a recommended guide to documentation and research such as the Manual of the APA or the MLA Handbook for Writers of Research Papers. If you still have doubts concerning proper documentation, seek advice from your instructor prior to submitting a final draft.

TAMU has penalties for plagiarism and cheating.

- **Penalties for Plagiarism:** Should a faculty member discover that a student has committed plagiarism, the student should receive a grade of 'F' in that course and the matter will be referred to the Honor Council for possible disciplinary action. The faculty member, however, may elect to give freshmen and sophomore students a "zero" for the assignment and to allow them to revise the assignment up to a grade of "F" (50%) if they believe that the student plagiarized out of ignorance or carelessness and not out of an attempt to deceive in order to earn an unmerited grade; the instructor must still report the offense to the Honor Council. This option should not be available to juniors, seniors, or graduate students, who cannot reasonably claim ignorance of documentation rules as an excuse. For repeat offenders in undergraduate courses or for an offender in any graduate course, the penalty for plagiarism is likely to include suspension or expulsion from the university.
  - *Caution:* Be very careful what you upload to Turnitin or send to your professor for evaluation. Whatever you upload for evaluation will be considered your final, approved draft. If it is plagiarized, you will be held responsible. The excuse that "it was only a draft" will not be accepted.
  - *Caution:* Also, do not share your electronic files with others. If you do, you are responsible for the possible consequences. If another student takes your file of a paper and changes the name to his or her name and submits it and you also submit the paper, we will hold both of you responsible for plagiarism. It is impossible for us to know with certainty who wrote the paper and who stole it. And, of course, we cannot know if there was collusion between you and the other student in the matter.
- **Penalties for Cheating:** Should a faculty member discover a student cheating on an exam or quiz or other class project, the student should receive a "zero" for the assignment and not be allowed to make the assignment up. The incident should be reported to the chair of the department and to the Honor Council. If the cheating is extensive, however, or if the assignment constitutes a major grade for the course (e.g., a final exam), or if the student has cheated in the past, the student should receive an "F" in the course, and the matter should be referred to the Honor Council. Additional

penalties, including suspension or expulsion from the university may be imposed. Under no circumstances should a student who deserves an “F” in the course be allowed to withdraw from the course with a “W.”

- **Caution:** Chat groups that start off as “study groups” can easily devolve into “cheating groups.” Be very careful not to join or remain any chat group if it begins to discuss specific information about exams or assignments that are meant to require individual work. If you are a member of such a group and it begins to cheat, you will be held responsible along with all the other members of the group. The TAMIU Honor Code requires that you report any such instances of cheating.
- **Student Right of Appeal:** Faculty will notify students immediately via the student’s TAMIU e-mail account that they have submitted plagiarized work. Students have the right to appeal a faculty member’s charge of academic dishonesty by notifying the TAMIU Honor Council of their intent to appeal as long as the notification of appeal comes within 10 business days of the faculty member’s e-mail message to the student and/or the Office of Student Conduct and Community Engagement. The Student Handbook provides more details.

## Use of Work in Two or More Courses

You may not submit work completed in one course for a grade in a second course unless you receive explicit permission to do so by the instructor of the second course. In general, you should get credit for a work product only once.

## TAMIU E-Mail and SafeZone

## Copyright Restrictions

The Copyright Act of 1976 grants to copyright owners the exclusive right to reproduce their works and distribute copies of their work. Works that receive copyright protection include published works such as a textbook. Copying a textbook without permission from the owner of the copyright may constitute copyright infringement. Civil and criminal penalties may be assessed for copyright infringement. Civil penalties include damages up to \$100,000; criminal penalties include a fine up to \$250,000 and imprisonment. Copyright laws do not allow students and professors to make photocopies of copyrighted materials, but you may copy a limited portion of a work, such as article from a journal or a chapter from a book for your own personal academic use or, in the case of a professor, for personal, limited classroom use. In general, the extent of your copying should not suggest that the purpose or the effect of your copying is to avoid paying for the materials. And, of course, you may not sell these copies for a profit. Thus, students who copy textbooks to avoid buying them or professors who provide photocopies of textbooks to enable students to save money are violating the law.

## Incompletes

Students who are unable to complete a course should withdraw from the course before the final date for withdrawal and receive a "W." To qualify for an "incomplete" and thus have the opportunity to complete the course at a later date, a student must meet the following criteria:

1. The student must have completed 90% of the course work assigned before the final date for withdrawing from a course with a "W", and the student must be passing the course;
2. The student cannot complete the course because an accident, an illness, or a traumatic personal or family event occurred after the final date for withdrawal from a course;
3. The student must sign an "Incomplete Grade Contract" and secure signatures of approval from the professor and the college dean.
4. The student must agree to complete the missing course work before the end of the next long semester; failure to meet this deadline will cause the "I" to automatically be converted to an "F"; extensions to this deadline may be granted by the dean of the college. This is the general policy regarding the circumstances under which an "incomplete" may be granted, but under exceptional circumstances, a student may receive an incomplete who does not meet all of the criteria above if the faculty member, department chair, and dean recommend it.

## WIN Contracts

The Department of Biology and Chemistry does not permit WIN contracts. For other departments within the college, WIN Contracts are offered only under exceptional circumstances and are limited to graduating seniors. Only courses offered by full-time TAMIU faculty or TAMIU instructors are eligible to be contracted for the WIN requirement. However, a WIN contract for a course taught by an adjunct may be approved, with special permission from the department chair and dean. Students must seek approval before beginning any work for the WIN Contract. No student will contract more than one course per semester. Summer WIN Contracts must continue through both summer sessions.

## Student Responsibility for Dropping a Course

It is the responsibility of the student to drop the course before the final date for withdrawal from a course. Faculty members, in fact, may not drop a student from a course without getting the approval of their department chair and dean.

## Independent Study Course

Independent Study (IS) courses are offered only under exceptional circumstances. Required courses intended to build academic skills may not be taken as IS (e.g., clinical supervision and internships). No student will take more than one IS course per semester. Moreover, IS courses are limited to seniors and graduate students. Summer IS course must continue through both summer sessions.



## Grade Changes & Appeals

Faculty are authorized to change final grades only when they have committed a computational error or an error in recording a grade, and they must receive the approval of their department chairs and the dean to change the grade. As part of that approval, they must attach a detailed explanation of the reason for the mistake. Only in rare cases would another reason be entertained as legitimate for a grade change. A student who is unhappy with his or her grade on an assignment must discuss the situation with the faculty member teaching the course. If students believe that they have been graded unfairly, they have the right to appeal the grade using a grade appeal process in the Student Handbook and in the Faculty Handbook.

## Final Examination

All courses in all colleges must include a comprehensive exam or performance and be given on the date and time specified by the Academic Calendar and the Final Exam schedule published by the Registrar's Office. In the College of Arts & Sciences all final exams must contain a written component. The written component should comprise at least 20% of the final exam grade. Exceptions to this policy must receive the approval of the department chair and the dean at the beginning of the semester.
