Course Description

Examines different communications topics including research underpinnings and everyday applications. May be repeated for credit when topic changes.

WIN-Designation

This course is designated as a writing-intensive (WIN) course. In this course, writing will not only be the subject of study, but it will also serve as a method of learning. Students will learn how communication in written, oral, and visual forms change according to purpose and genre. Brainstorming, drafting, revising, and peer-workshopping are integrated into the course curriculum and are the required components of this writing-intensive course. The final Research Paper is the designated assignment for WIN assessment.

Additional Course Information

Course runs from July 7 to Aug. 6 with Final Exam on Aug. 7.

COURSE DESCRIPTION: (Special Topics courses vary each time): For the Writing for Comic Books topic, this course includes the key storytelling aspects for narrative development for comic books and graphic novels: an introduction to and a brief history of comics and superheroes, worldbuilding, character development, with a primary focus on storytelling style and techniques in script format.

ADDITIONAL COURSE RESOURCES: You will need a computer or laptop for this course with some type of word-processing software like Microsoft Word to complete the three writing assignments. With your TAMIU email, Microsoft Word is included; you can access it by logging into your TAMIU email account, clicking the App Launcher Menu button (a series of 3x3 dots in a square) and then select Word from the options. It's also a good idea to back up all of your work for the course to your One Drive, also included with your TAMIU email. Select that same App Launcher Menu button and then select OneDrive (the one with the cloud icon)—if you're familiar with Google Drive, it works similar.

Students will need access to watch Star Wars films, especially *Star Wars: Episode IV: A New Hope* (1977). If you don't own the films, you can temporarily subscribe to Disney+. I will attempt to offer a movie watch party online for those who cannot watch it otherwise.



COURSE STRUCTURE: Students are expected to log into Blackboard regularly, read course materials each week, follow each Blackboard Module in the order it's presented within the timeframe for each module, starting with the PowerPoints/lectures, then proceeding to online discussions (if present), then proceeding to a weekly activity (if present) and then finally to each week's main assignment. Writing assignments are turned in via Blackboard Turnitin, unless otherwise noted. Activities are turned in via Blackboard Dropbox, unless otherwise noted.

To get the most out of this course, it's best for students to complete things in the order they're presented. Each reaching assignment 0-prepares students for the PowerPoints/lectures, which hopefully make the reading assignments more clear (through examples, visuals, and context) and further the ideas established in the readings.

ANNOUNCEMENTS/COURSE MESSAGES/EMAILS: The instructor will frequently use announcement during the regular course week (Mondays-Fridays), or otherwise, as needed.

The instructor and students may also communicate via course discussions. Students may post to general discussion topics to ask questions (not graded) about activities, assignments, etc.

If a student is in need of a faster response, I recommend they email me directly to thomas.brown@tamiu.edu rather than use course messages. I check my emails more frequently than Blackboard.

I do my best to respond to your messages as soon as possible, but my schedule and yours may not match up in some respects. Please be patient, especially if you email over the weekend (late Friday through Sunday) or during early morning hours.

PARTICIPATION: Class online participation is graded, encouraged, and expected. However, participation does not mean being disruptive or rude in class. Please be considerate of your classmates and instructor. These online interactions may include discussion forums, peer reviews, and/or lecture responses.

-----COURSE ASSIGNMENTS OVERVIEW-----

WRITTEN WORK: All out-of-class assignments must be typed unless stated otherwise. Please staple papers having multiple pages before coming to class. Some assignments may be submitted electronically through our class Blackboard. All online assignments are due at 11:59 p.m. on the day indicated on your class schedule, unless otherwise noted in the syllabus schedule and/or on Blackboard. The instructor will post a Blackboard announcement for any due date adjustments.

Assignments which do not adhere to assignment guidelines will be rejected. For example, handwritten papers will not be accepted. It is the student's responsibility to submit assignments as directed, either online or in class. NO assignments will be accepted via e-mail. Please use Turnitin on Blackboard for writing assignments or Blackboard Dropbox for activities.

This course includes four written assignments that make up a significant portion of the grade:

- **Writing Assignment 1: Worldbuilding Analysis (Setting & Genre)** Write 300-400 words of research analysis in MLA style. Cite examples about the world, based off our worldbuilding lecture from a comic book of your choice and offer analysis. Upload the final draft to Turnitin. Please see rubric and complete assignment instructions on Blackboard. This paper will be a single draft.
- **Writing Assignment 2: Character Development** Upload the final draft to Turnitin. Please see rubric and complete assignment instructions on Blackboard. This paper will be a single draft.
- **Writing Assignment 3: Story Structure & Plot** Upload the final draft to Turnitin. Please see rubric and complete assignment instructions on Blackboard. This paper will be a single draft.
- **Writing Assignment 4: Comic Book Script** Use Celtx or other screenwriting software to create a complete comic book script for a 22-page comic book. Output the script into PDF format ONLY. Upload the final draft to Turnitin. Please see rubric and complete assignment instructions on Blackboard. This paper will have a rough draft and final draft. There will also be a peer review for this writing assignment.

EXAM: There will be one exam. The Final Exam will be comprehensive, covering all lectures, PowerPoints, Activities, and Quizzes and/or Lecture Responses (if applicable) from the course. The exam will be given online through Blackboard; students must be proctored using one of the available proctoring services. Respondus Monitor, which links through Blackboard, will be used for this course. Students will need to pay for proctoring software. In terms of price, the \$15 individual student license for a full-year is probably the best deal as the license allows the student to use the service for all classes at TAMIU.

Respondus Monitor (\$15 fee) Requirement

This course requires the use of LockDown Browser and Respondus Monitor (webcam) for online exams. The webcam can be built into your computer or can be the type that plugs in with a USB cable.

There is a short video on Blackboard to get a basic understanding of LockDown Browser and Respondus Monitor (the webcam feature). A student Quick Start Guide (PDF) is also available.

Download Instructions

Click the *Student Support* top-middle tab located in Blackboard. Scroll down to the *Instructional Technologies* section, and click on the Respondus LockDown Browser icon. Download is free.

Once Installed

- Open LockDown Browser
- Log into Blackboard Learn
- Navigate to the test and begin

Note: You won't be able to access tests with a standard web browser. If this is tried, an error message will indicate that the test requires the use of LockDown Browser. Simply start LockDown Browser and navigate back to the exam to continue.

Cost for Respondus Monitor

There is a \$15 fee for the webcam feature that's used with LockDown Browser (sometimes referred to as Respondus Monitor). This is a one-time fee, valid for 12 months (365 days) for all courses or exams that use Respondus Monitor. You will be prompted to make the purchase the first time an exam requires the use of LockDown Browser's webcam feature. Payment can be made with PayPal, Visa or Mastercard.

To pay for Respondus Monitor:

1. Start Respondus LockDown Browser.
2. Navigate to your test.
3. Complete the set-up process, which includes a payment screen for entering credit card information.
4. Payment and entering credit card information is only necessary one-time per course.

Guidelines

When taking an online exam that requires LockDown Browser and a webcam, remember the following guidelines:

- Select a location where you won't be interrupted
- Before starting the test, know how much time is available for it, and also that you've allotted sufficient time to complete it
- Turn off all other devices (e.g. tablets, phones, second computers)
- Clear your area of all external materials — books, papers, other devices
- Remain at your computer for the duration of the test
- To produce a good webcam video, do the following:
 - Avoid wearing baseball caps or hats with brims
 - Ensure your computer or tablet is on a firm surface (a desk or table) — not on your lap, a bed, or other surface that might move
 - If using a built-in webcam, avoid tilting the screen after the webcam setup is complete
 - Take the exam in a well-lit room and avoid backlighting, such as sitting with your back to a window
- LockDown Browser will prevent you from accessing other websites or applications; you will be unable to exit the test until all questions are completed and submitted.

Getting Help

Several resources are available if you encounter problems with LockDown Browser:

- The Windows and Mac versions of LockDown Browser have a "Help Center" button located on the toolbar. Use the "System & Network Check" to troubleshoot issues.

Webcam Checkout for Personal Computer If students are unable to use personal or borrowed computers and equipment, students may stop by the Instructional Technology and Distance Education Services office to check out webcams (with built-in microphones). The office is located at **Killam Library 259** (down the hall from the HelpDesk) and is open **Monday through Friday from 8 a.m. to 7 p.m.** Checkout for a webcam is on a first-come, first-service basis. Speak with an eLearning staff member to checkout a camera. Students will sign an Equipment Loaner Agreement, making them responsible for the care of the camera. Webcams checked out must be returned within five business days of the checkout date.

READING ASSIGNMENTS: Reading assignments for the course are to be completed before the online lecture for which they are assigned. The reading assignments will prepare you for the content of the lectures, as well as for the exams.

MAKE-UP WORK: Make-ups for course assignments are at the discretion of the instructor and must be discussed and scheduled. Make-up exams may be in essay format. You must contact the instructor within one week of the missed exam for instructions on how to complete your make-up. There is NO make-up option for a Final Exam.



Obviously, the best plan is to turn assignments in on time (the deadline) so they may be graded in a reasonable amount of time to give students necessary feedback. Assignments that are received late will have reduced grades for each class day past the deadline (see Late assignments or speeches, below). Late work **MUST** be made up within a week of the due date. Depending on the circumstances, the point loss will be decided upon by the instructor. Typically, the following rules will affect point deduction for late assignments, though the instructor may take special situations into consideration:

- For each class period an assignment is late, the work will take a 20-percent grade reduction.
- Students are required to contact the instructor about make-up work. The instructor will NOT make an effort to contact a student about make-up work. A student's ability to turn in late work will be decided at the discretion of the instructor. Reasons for the lateness of the work will be taken into account.

BLACKBOARD GRADE BOOK: This is a great tool for your reference while in the course. I will do my best to keep it fairly updated with course information and resources. It may also be used as a place to ask questions, which I will try to monitor and respond to at my first availability. I strongly suggest everyone keep a running record of their grades as assignments/evaluations are returned. I also recommend keeping a copy of all of your papers/assignments that are returned to you up until final grades are posted.

LATE ASSIGNMENTS: Late assignments, will receive a grade reduction of 20% (two letter grades lost) for every class day they are late. If you do not have a verifiable and accepted excuse, the late assignment grade reduction will be applied. A "verifiable excuse" is determined on a case-by-case situation by the instructor but normally includes things such as a doctor's excuse, military service, etc., in accordance with the policies of the College of Arts and Sciences (see below).

EXPECTATIONS: Your overall class participation grade is determined by the discretion of the instructor. These points are factored based on attendance (not factored for online courses) and the following list of expectations:

- Adoption of an "I can do" attitude
- Being punctual and prepared for each class
- Positive participation in class discussions as well as professional behavior in all communication with other students and the instructor
- Being attentive and respectful during lecture and any student presentations
- Compliance with all Academic Policies & Requirements of Texas A&M International University and the College of Arts and Sciences (see below)

COMMON COURTESY: Please use common courtesy during classes. For many, getting up in front of a group of people for presentations can be extremely stressful. It is vital that the classroom atmosphere be kept light and enjoyable for all. Discourteous behavior will be penalized in participation points (see Expectations, above).

- If you are late to class or leave during class, do not interrupt fellow students if they are giving a presentation. In such an event, you will be asked to leave and participation points may be removed. Please look and listen outside the classroom door to check before entering.

- DO NOT interrupt a fellow student during their presentation. If you have questions, wait until the end of their allotted time (or for a question-and-answers session, if applicable).
- Vulgar language and inappropriate statements have no place in the classroom.

INSTRUCTOR BIOGRAPHY: Mr. Thomas R. Brown, who publishes as "T. Rob Brown," is a photographer and writer who began his career in 1993. In addition to more than 20 years as a full-time daily newspaper photojournalist, where he served as photographer, writer, editor, copyeditor, and page designer for numerous daily Midwest newspapers, he also served as a freelance writer for Marvel Comics and Star Wars on four published books from 2009 to 2012, including the Origins award-winning *Marvel Heroic Roleplaying: Civil War*, *Marvel Heroic Roleplaying: Civil War: Young Avengers and Runaways*, *Star Wars: Galaxy of Intrigue*, and Silver Ennie-winning *Star Wars: Clone Wars Campaign Guide*.

Twice nominated for the Pulitzer Prize, Brown earned more than 40 national, regional and state awards for photography and writing during his journalism career. Following a return to schooling to pursue his master's degree in 2014, Brown began freelancing for *The Kansas City Star* as a



photographer. He continues work on his fantasy and science fiction novels, screenplays, and photography books. Currently, he is working on *Literally Breathtaking*—a photography book about Cusco and Machu Picchu, Peru, along with Chile's Santiago region.

Brown earned his bachelor's (1993) from Missouri Southern State University in Joplin and his master's (2015) from Pittsburg State University in Pittsburg, Kansas. He is originally from the Kansas City, Missouri, area, and began teaching at Texas A&M International University in Fall 2017.

The instructor is fully aware that some usage of AI can be a tool to help expedite work, to decrease workload, and to help improve quality of the final work. Generative AI is not allowed – students must write their papers themselves. Any usage of AI outside of the professor's permission constitutes a violation of the TAMIU Honor Code and will be reported to the Honor Council.

Optional film: Hamill, Mark (2004). *Comic Book: The Movie*. A direct-to-DVD mockumentary starring and directed by Mark Hamill. Includes interviews with Stan Lee, Kevin Smith, Peter David, Matt Groening, and other industry professionals.

REQUIRED COURSE RESOURCE: Celtx or another type of screenwriting software. Celtx has a free version. The instructor will help students find the free version on the first day of the script section of the course. This software, while originally designed for movies, also has features for comic book writing. Most comic book writers use traditional film writing software. Celtx is fairly simple and easy to use.

REQUIRED: Students will need access to comic books. There are many ways to acquire comic books.

Students may choose any of the following:

1. Your personal comic book collection. Some of you are probably already comic-book readers and have a collection. You can just use the comics you already own.
2. Purchase a physical comic book or two from a local retailer. Keep in mind, there is a difference between a comic book and a graphic novel. While the writing techniques and panel structure is the same, the primary difference is the length. For the purposes of this course, you will write a script for a standard 22-page comic book (the average length of most comics)—so I recommend you have at least one 22-page comic book to look at as an example. Many modern comic books include a digital code (if it's brand new) that you can redeem for a digital copy of that comic also.
3. Subscribe to a digital comic book service, such as Marvel Unlimited (or just create a free account and purchase some of their free comics). Dark Horse (digital.darkhorse.com) and DC (DC Universe Infinite) have their own comic book services also. Most of them offer some free sample comics.



Just make sure at least one of the free ones that you want to read is a standard 22-page comic book. Keep in mind, a lot of them have digital versions of their Free Comic Book Day comics (held in early May each year).

4. Purchase digital comics on Amazon.com (they also have some free ones). They also offer a subscription service similar to Marvel's Unlimited. Amazon's is called ComiXology Unlimited.

5. You could check the local libraries to see if they have comic books.

Grading Criteria

COVID-19 Related Policies

Required Class Attendance

Students are expected to attend every class in person (or virtually, if the class is online) and to complete all assignments. If you cannot attend class, it is your responsibility to communicate absences with your professors. The faculty member will decide if your excuse is valid and thus may provide lecture materials of the class. According to University policy, acceptable reasons for an absence, which cannot affect a student's grade, include:

- Participation in an authorized University activity.
- Death or major illness in a student's immediate family.
- Illness of a dependent family member.
- Participation in legal proceedings or administrative procedures that require a student's presence.
- Religious holy day.
- Illness that is too severe or contagious for the student to attend class.
- Required participation in military duties.
- Mandatory admission interviews for professional or graduate school which cannot be rescheduled.

Students are responsible for providing satisfactory evidence to faculty members within seven calendar days of their absence and return to class. They must substantiate the reason for the absence. If the absence is excused, faculty members must either provide students with the opportunity to make up the exam or other work missed, or provide a satisfactory alternative to complete the exam or other work missed within 30 calendar days from the date of absence. Students who miss class due to a University-sponsored activity are responsible for identifying their absences to their instructors with as much advance notice as possible.

Classroom Behavior (applies to online or Face-to-Face Classes)

TAMU encourages classroom discussion and academic debate as an essential intellectual activity. It is essential that students learn to express and defend their beliefs, but it is also essential that they learn to listen and respond respectfully to others whose beliefs they may not share. The University will always tolerate different, unorthodox, and unpopular points of view, but it will not tolerate condescending or insulting remarks. When students verbally abuse or ridicule and intimidate others whose views they do not agree with, they subvert the free exchange of ideas that should characterize a university classroom. If their actions are deemed by the professor to be disruptive, they will be subject to appropriate disciplinary action (please refer to Student Handbook Article 4).

TAMU Honor Code: Plagiarism and Cheating

As a TAMU student, you are bound by the TAMU Honor Code to conduct yourself ethically in all your activities as a TAMU student and to report violations of the Honor Code. Please read carefully the Student Handbook Article 7 and Article 10 available at <https://www.tamtu.edu/scce/studenthandbook.shtml> (<https://www.tamtu.edu/scce/studenthandbook.shtml>).

We are committed to strict enforcement of the Honor Code. Violations of the Honor Code tend to involve claiming work that is not one's own, most commonly plagiarism in written assignments and any form of cheating on exams and other types of assignments.

Plagiarism is the presentation of someone else's work as your own. It occurs when you:

1. Borrow someone else's facts, ideas, or opinions and put them entirely in your own words. You must acknowledge that these thoughts are not your own by immediately citing the source in your paper. Failure to do this is plagiarism.
2. Borrow someone else's words (short phrases, clauses, or sentences), you must enclose the copied words in quotation marks as well as citing the source. Failure to do this is plagiarism.
3. Present someone else's paper or exam (stolen, borrowed, or bought) as your own. You have committed a clearly intentional form of intellectual theft and have put your academic future in jeopardy. This is the worst form of plagiarism.

Here is another explanation from the 2020, seventh edition of the Manual of The American Psychological Association (APA):

"Plagiarism is the act of presenting the words, idea, or images of another as your own; it denies authors or creators of content the credit they are due. Whether deliberate or unintentional, plagiarism violates ethical standards in scholarship" (p. 254). This same principle applies to the illicit use of AI.

Plagiarism: Researchers do not claim the words and ideas of another as their own; they give credit where credit is due. Quotations marks should be used to indicate the exact words of another. Each time you paraphrase another author (i.e., summarize a passage or rearrange the order of a sentence and change some of the words), you need to credit the source in the text. The key element of this principle is that authors do not present the work of another as if it were their own words. This can extend to ideas as well as written words. If authors model a study after one done by someone else, the originating author should be given credit. If the rationale for a study was suggested in the discussion section of someone else's article, the person should be given credit. Given the free exchange of ideas, which is very important for the health of intellectual discourse, authors may not know where

an idea for a study originated. If authors do know, however, they should acknowledge the source; this includes personal communications (p. 11). For guidance on proper documentation, consult the Academic Success Center or a recommended guide to documentation and research such as the Manual of the APA or the MLA Handbook for Writers of Research Papers. If you still have doubts concerning proper documentation, seek advice from your instructor prior to submitting a final draft.

TAMIU has penalties for plagiarism and cheating.

- **Penalties for Plagiarism:** Should a faculty member discover that a student has committed plagiarism, the student should receive a grade of 'F' in that course and the matter will be referred to the Honor Council for possible disciplinary action. The faculty member, however, may elect to give freshmen and sophomore students a "zero" for the assignment and to allow them to revise the assignment up to a grade of "F" (50%) if they believe that the student plagiarized out of ignorance or carelessness and not out of an attempt to deceive in order to earn an unmerited grade; the instructor must still report the offense to the Honor Council. This option should not be available to juniors, seniors, or graduate students, who cannot reasonably claim ignorance of documentation rules as an excuse. For repeat offenders in undergraduate courses or for an offender in any graduate course, the penalty for plagiarism is likely to include suspension or expulsion from the university.
 - **Caution:** Be very careful what you upload to Turnitin or send to your professor for evaluation. Whatever you upload for evaluation will be considered your final, approved draft. If it is plagiarized, you will be held responsible. The excuse that "it was only a draft" will not be accepted.
 - **Caution:** Also, do not share your electronic files with others. If you do, you are responsible for the possible consequences. If another student takes your file of a paper and changes the name to his or her name and submits it and you also submit the paper, we will hold both of you responsible for plagiarism. It is impossible for us to know with certainty who wrote the paper and who stole it. And, of course, we cannot know if there was collusion between you and the other student in the matter.
- **Penalties for Cheating:** Should a faculty member discover a student cheating on an exam or quiz or other class project, the student should receive a "zero" for the assignment and not be allowed to make the assignment up. The incident should be reported to the chair of the department and to the Honor Council. If the cheating is extensive, however, or if the assignment constitutes a major grade for the course (e.g., a final exam), or if the student has cheated in the past, the student should receive an "F" in the course, and the matter should be referred to the Honor Council. Additional penalties, including suspension or expulsion from the university may be imposed. Under no circumstances should a student who deserves an "F" in the course be allowed to withdraw from the course with a "W."
 - **Caution:** Chat groups that start off as "study groups" can easily devolve into "cheating groups." Be very careful not to join or remain any chat group if it begins to discuss specific information about exams or assignments that are meant to require individual work. If you are a member of such a group and it begins to cheat, you will be held responsible along with all the other members of the group. The TAMIU Honor Code requires that you report any such instances of cheating.
- **Student Right of Appeal:** Faculty will notify students immediately via the student's TAMIU e-mail account that they have submitted plagiarized work. Students have the right to appeal a faculty member's charge of academic dishonesty by notifying the TAMIU Honor Council of their intent to appeal as long as the notification of appeal comes within 10 business days of the faculty member's e-mail message to the student and/or the Office of Student Conduct and Community Engagement. The Student Handbook provides more details.

Use of Work in Two or More Courses

You may not submit work completed in one course for a grade in a second course unless you receive explicit permission to do so by the instructor of the second course. In general, you should get credit for a work product only once.

AI Policies

Your instructor will provide you with their personal policy on the use of AI in the classroom setting and associated coursework.

TAMIU E-Mail and SafeZone

Personal Announcements sent to students through TAMIU E-mail (tamiu.edu or dusty email) are the official means of communicating course and university business with students and faculty –not the U.S. Mail and no other e-mail addresses. Students and faculty must check their TAMIU e-mail accounts regularly, if not daily. Not having seen an important TAMIU e-mail or message from a faculty member, chair, or dean is not accepted as an excuse for failure to take important action.

Students, faculty, and staff are encouraged to download the SafeZone app, which is a free mobile app for all University faculty, staff, and students. SafeZone allows you to: report safety concerns (24/7), get connected with mental health professionals, activate location sharing with authorities, and anonymously report incidents. Copyright Restrictions

The Copyright Act of 1976 grants to copyright owners the exclusive right to reproduce their works and distribute copies of their work. Works that receive copyright protection include published works such as a textbook. Copying a textbook without permission from the owner of the copyright may constitute copyright infringement. Civil and criminal penalties may be assessed for copyright infringement. Civil penalties include damages up to \$100,000; criminal penalties include a fine up to \$250,000 and imprisonment. Copyright laws do not allow students and professors to make photocopies of copyrighted materials, but you may copy a limited portion of a work, such as article from a journal or a chapter from a book for your own personal academic use or, in the case of a professor, for personal, limited classroom use. In general, the extent of your copying should not

suggest that the purpose or the effect of your copying is to avoid paying for the materials. And, of course, you may not sell these copies for a profit. Thus, students who copy textbooks to avoid buying them or professors who provide photocopies of textbooks to enable students to save money are violating the law.

Students with Disabilities

Texas A&M International University seeks to provide reasonable accommodations for all qualified persons with disabilities. Incompletes

Students who are unable to complete a course should withdraw from the course before the final date for withdrawal and receive a "W." To qualify for an "incomplete" and thus have the opportunity to complete the course at a later date, a student must meet the following criteria:

1. The student must have completed 90% of the course work assigned before the final date for withdrawing from a course with a "W", and the student must be passing the course;
2. The student cannot complete the course because an accident, an illness, or a traumatic personal or family event occurred after the final date for withdrawal from a course;
3. The student must sign an "Incomplete Grade Contract" and secure signatures of approval from the professor and the college dean.
4. The student must agree to complete the missing course work before the end of the next long semester; failure to meet this deadline will cause the "I" to automatically be converted to an "F"; extensions to this deadline may be granted by the dean of the college. This is the general policy regarding the circumstances under which an "incomplete" may be granted, but under exceptional circumstances, a student may receive an incomplete who does not meet all of the criteria above if the faculty member, department chair, and dean recommend it.

WIN Contracts

The Department of Biology and Chemistry does not permit WIN contracts. For other departments within the college, WIN Contracts are offered only under exceptional circumstances and are limited to graduating seniors. Only courses offered by full-time TAMIU faculty or TAMIU instructors are eligible to be contracted for the WIN requirement. However, a WIN contract for a course taught by an adjunct may be approved, with special permission from the department chair and dean. Students must seek approval before beginning any work for the WIN Contract. No student will contract more than one course per semester. Summer WIN Contracts must continue through both summer sessions.

Student Responsibility for Dropping a Course

It is the responsibility of the student to drop the course before the final date for withdrawal from a course. Faculty members, in fact, may not drop a student from a course without getting the approval of their department chair and dean.

Independent Study Course

Independent Study (IS) courses are offered only under exceptional circumstances. Required courses intended to build academic skills may not be taken as IS (e.g., clinical supervision and internships). No student will take more than one IS course per semester. Moreover, IS courses are limited to seniors and graduate students. Summer IS course must continue through both summer sessions.

Grade Changes & Appeals

Faculty are authorized to change final grades only when they have committed a computational error or an error in recording a grade, and they must receive the approval of their department chairs and the dean to change the grade. As part of that approval, they must attach a detailed explanation of the reason for the mistake. Only in rare cases would another reason be entertained as legitimate for a grade change. A student who is unhappy with his or her grade on an assignment must discuss the situation with the faculty member teaching the course. If students believe that they have been graded unfairly, they have the right to appeal the grade using a grade appeal process in the Student Handbook and in the Faculty Handbook.

Final Examination

All courses in all colleges must include a comprehensive exam or performance and be given on the date and time specified by the Academic Calendar and the Final Exam schedule published by the Registrar's Office. In the College of Arts & Sciences all final exams must contain a written component. The written component should comprise at least 20% of the final exam grade. Exceptions to this policy must receive the approval of the department chair and the dean at the beginning of the semester.
