Course Description

This class serves as an introduction to the problems of understanding, analyzing and writing about decorative arts, design history, and material culture. Prerequisites: ARTS 1303 and ARTS 1304 or consent of the instructor.

WIN-Designation

This course is designated as a writing-intensive (WIN) course. In this course, writing will not only be the subject of study, but it will also serve as a method of learning. Students will learn how communication in written, oral, and visual forms change according to purpose and genre. Brainstorming, drafting, revising, and peer-workshopping are integrated into the course curriculum and are the required components of this writing-intensive course. The final Research Paper is the designated assignment for WIN assessment.

COURSE CONTENT ADVISORY:

As an art history class, this course examines works of art from the past and present often tied to weighty and complex subject matters, histories, and ideologies. This class shows and discusses artworks containing nudes and themes and topics such as identity, death, harm, illness, trauma, war, violence, etc. Lectures will treat these images, themes, and topics with the upmost respect and full consideration. Students must have an open mind and willingness to intellectually engage with these subjects and related artworks - **if this is not possible, it is strongly advised to withdraw from the course.**

**COURSE DESCRIPTION:**

This class serves as an introduction to the problems of understanding, analyzing and writing about decorative arts, design history, and material culture. Prerequisites: ARTS 1303 and ARTS 1304 or consent of the instructor.

CORE QUESTIONS AND GUIDING DISCUSSION:

In this course, we will seek to answer the following questions: *How do objects have “lives”? What kind of art historical information resides within material culture? How can we see objects and materials as nodes for thinking about human cultures, societal activities, and everyday life?*

These questions will be discussed in relation to various influential objects and materials used within art practices by human cultures around the globe. The precise chronology examined within this course will be extensive – looking back to ancient contexts through the present day – to create trans-historical “object lessons” that compare and contrast how artists, artisans, and craftspeople have used objects and materials to express complex religious, social, political, economic, and ecological meanings and values. Weekly case studies will introduce an object or material serving as the guide for artworks, class discussion, readings, and assignments. Over the course of this class, we will be thinking extensively about the concept of *materiality* and the many theoretical frameworks for understanding humanity’s relationship with material culture. These ideas include, but not limited to: the body as object, the power of everyday objects, objecthood and thingness, vibrant matter, materials and the environment, technology and commodities, and symbols and signs. By the end of the class, students will gain a comprehensive knowledge of material culture and how it influences visual culture, art history, and art practice.

Student Learning Outcomes

- Students will critique and discuss how artists and artisans use materials to express religious, political, economic, societal, and ecological meanings, values, and desires.
- Students will investigate individual case studies and connect them to art historical ideas and concepts.
- Students will engage in reading and writing assignments designed to professionalize ways of talking about art.
- Students will participate in oral presentations to develop public speaking skills and generate comfort in discussing art objects with others.

REQUIRED READINGS & OTHER MEDIA:

There is no physical textbook for this class. Dr. Z will supply students with all readings and other required multimedia material (videos, podcasts, online interviews, etc.) via Blackboard. Please see the attached Course Schedule for each week’s assigned readings and required page numbers.

Please note, completing the readings by the scheduled class date is required for class discussion and in-class pop quizzes.

This syllabus is the main roadmap and resource for the course, and the instructor may update it when needed based upon overall class progress or any other unforeseen event requiring a change. If this occurs, students will be notified.

Grading Criteria

GRADING AND RUBRICS:

Grades are recorded from “A” to “F.”

You earn your grades based on the quality of your work. You can track your progress in class by looking at Blackboard. If you are concerned about your progress, I would happily chat with you anytime to discuss ways to improve your work.

As (90-100): This grade reflects EXCELLENT work, superior understanding of the material, and exceptional growth in knowledge.

Bs (80-89): GOOD WORK. This grade demonstrates hard work in all areas of the course, reflecting an excellent understanding and apparent growth in knowledge.

Cs (70-79): AVERAGE WORK. This grade demonstrates some work in all areas of the course, and some growth in knowledge, but effort or understanding may be inconsistent and/or lacking. A student earns this grade for the minimum work required for the course.



Ds (60-69): BELOW AVERAGE. This grade demonstrates little or no apparent work in any area of the course when the student shows little knowledge growth or lacks effort. It shows work that does not consistently meet the minimum requirements for the course.

Fs (below 60): failing.

Late Work:

Each day an assignment is late equals a deduction of a letter grade for that item. After 3 days, the assignment will no longer be accepted, and you will receive an automatic ZERO.

If you have a personal problem keeping you from submitting assignments by the deadline, please let me know ASAP before an assignment is due; I will not reopen assignments after the deadline unless presented with a certified medical excuse.

Extra Credit:

Opportunities to earn extra credit may occur throughout the semester but are not guaranteed. Dr. Z will inform you about the specific requirements and the opportunities for earning extra credit.

EXPECTATIONS AND RESPONSIBILITIES:

Time Commitment: Students must work through every component of this class (lectures, readings, assignments, and class preparation) in a timely and comprehensive manner.

Students must allocate at least 6 hours each week to fully cover the content presented, including the lectures, readings, assignments, and class preparation.

NOTE: You must set aside extra time to study and complete assignments and projects.

Students should take notes and maintain the time commitment for the course. Keeping up with the work is essential to success. If you keep up with the work promptly, engage fully and comprehensively with course ideas and concepts in and outside of class, and come prepared to discuss the material, you will do well in the course.

No Use of Generative AI for Assignment Content. This course assumes that all work students submit is their human thought, whether they work individually or in groups. Students should not have AI write any substantive portion of an assignment using generative tools like ChatGPT, etc.

Students suspected of using outside sources and/or AI in this manner will receive zero credit for the assignment and will need to come to Dr. Z's office hours to answer questions about their assignment. Cases could also be reported for academic dishonesty if it demonstrates plagiarism infringement.

Writing aids such as Grammarly are okay if they do not violate the above AI policy.

Technology:

Access to technology and reliable internet is required for this course to access assignments, other course materials, and submission portals.

Computer labs are in Cowart Hall, Killam Library, the Academic Innovation Center, Pellegrino Hall, and the Student Center. The Office of Information Technology also offers a Loaner Laptop Program for students, which requires an online application process.

There is no texting or social media use during class, and all computer work must relate to in-class activities and/or notetaking.

Dr. Z will periodically walk around the room to monitor screens and pause the lecture until cell phones are removed, and non-course-related activities are stopped.

If this becomes a consistent issue, Dr. Z will ban the use of technology.

COURSE ASSIGNMENTS

Attendance:

[1 point for each weekly class meeting, 26 individual days = 26 points total]

Dr. Z will start taking attendance Week 2.



Attendance is required for each class period and is a critical part of the student's success in this class. Roll will be taken at the beginning of each class period so arrive promptly to class. Arriving late and leaving early is disruptive and disrespectful to Dr. Z and your fellow students, so don't do it! If you are not in present in class by the time I finish attendance, you will not be marked – there is only a cushion of around 5 minutes.

You are allowed 3 penalty-free absences for the entire semester without excuse (so use them wisely!). Each unexcused absence beyond three will result in the lowering of your final grade by a full letter grade. If an absence falls on an in-class assignment deadline without being turned in prior or that same day, the assignment is counted as late.

Dr. Z is not responsible to catch students up on missed content in lectures - find a buddy to ask for notes.

Reading Concept Cloud + Written Discussion:

[10 points each, 5 for CC and 5 for WD, 10 in total = 100 points total]

Students will design a Concept Cloud using Microsoft Whiteboard to visually connect key themes, arguments, or methodologies from the two assigned readings for the week. The Concept Cloud must map out the relationships, intersections, and contradictions between the texts using nodes, color-coded sticky notes, and directional arrows.

Alongside the visual map, students will submit a brief written justification explaining their design choices, clarifying the specific connections highlighted in the cloud, and defending their interpretation of how the two texts engage in a critical dialogue.

Finishing the required readings for each class meeting is important for comprehension of ideas and for discussion. It is also an essential skill to learn as a university student.

Reading Concept Clouds are DUE by 11:49PM on Blackboard the night before the last meeting day of the week (Mostly, Wednesdays but occasionally Mondays. Please see the Course Schedule for DUE DATES.

I am very cognizant of your time as students and chose readings that are manageable and directly related to course content. Reading academic texts can be enjoyable because you do not need to fully understand everything (that is why we are here to learn!).

Your concept clouds will be exported as images for submission, while your written justification can be typed using the text box in the submission.

Dr. Z will formally present the prompt and instructions for this assignment beginning Week 2 with online submissions starting Week 3.

Object Lesson Individual Presentation + Written Script

[15 for Presentation, 10 for Script = 25 points total]

During Week 6 and 7, students will conduct individual presentations functioning as their Midterm assessment.

Students will select a specific material from Week 2 – Week 5 and deliver an individual presentation exploring how its physical qualities inform the interpretation of **ONE** artwork through an "Object Lesson." The presentation will demonstrate how the material itself carries historical, social, and theoretical meaning, directly linking the artwork's materiality to course lectures and assigned readings. Alongside the oral presentation, students will submit their polished written script of their talk used to build their material analysis.

Dr. Z will formally introduce the prompt and instructions for this assignment Week 3.

Final Project Proposal and Rough Outline

[10 for Proposal, 5 for Outline = 15 points total]

To prepare for the final written project, students will submit a formal proposal and rough outline. At this point, students must choose their ONE art object and articulate its material and artistic biography, tracing its physical production, provenance, exhibition history, and cultural reception. This proposal must include a working thesis statement and research (scholarly articles) that show how the object's physical biography influences its artistic meaning.

Accompanying the proposal, students will submit a rough outline mapping the logical progression of the paper.

Dr. Z will formally introduce the prompt and instructions for this assignment Week 9

Final Project: Life of an Object Research Paper

[30 points total]



Expanding upon the Final Project Proposal, students will analyze the material “life” of their art object in a formal research paper. Students will construct an original thesis that argues how the physical qualities of the work connect to social and artistic matters that transform the viewer's understanding of the work.

Required Class Attendance

Students are expected to attend every class in person (or virtually, if the class is online) and to complete all assignments. If you cannot attend class, it is your responsibility to communicate absences with your professors. The faculty member will decide if your excuse is valid and thus may provide lecture materials of the class. According to University policy, acceptable reasons for an absence, which cannot affect a student's grade, include:

- Participation in an authorized University activity.
- Death or major illness in a student's immediate family.
- Illness of a dependent family member.

- Participation in legal proceedings or administrative procedures that require a student's presence.
- Religious holy day.
- Illness that is too severe or contagious for the student to attend class.
- Required participation in military duties.
- Mandatory admission interviews for professional or graduate school which cannot be rescheduled.

Students are responsible for providing satisfactory evidence to faculty members within seven calendar days of their absence and return to class. They must substantiate the reason for the absence. If the absence is excused, faculty members must either provide students with the opportunity to make up the exam or other work missed, or provide a satisfactory alternative to complete the exam or other work missed within 30 calendar days from the date of absence. Students who miss class due to a University-sponsored activity are responsible for identifying their absences to their instructors with as much advance notice as possible.

Classroom Behavior (applies to online or Face-to-Face Classes)

In the classroom, students are expected to listen attentively, participate respectfully, and adhere to established rules. Behavior that interferes with the class lecture may result in disciplinary action, ensuring a productive and respectful learning environment for everyone. Any disputes over academic matters should be addressed calmly and constructively, ideally during designated times such as office hours or after class. TAMUI Honor Code: Plagiarism and Cheating

As a TAMUI student, you are bound by the TAMUI Honor Code to conduct yourself ethically in all your activities as a TAMUI student and to report violations of the Honor Code. Please read carefully the Student Handbook Article 7 and Article 10 available at Student Handbook (<https://www.tamui.edu/handbook/index.shtml>).

We are committed to strict enforcement of the Honor Code. Violations of the Honor Code tend to involve claiming work that is not one's own, most commonly plagiarism in written assignments and any form of cheating on exams and other types of assignments.

Plagiarism is the presentation of someone else's work as your own. It occurs when you:

1. Borrow someone else's facts, ideas, or opinions and put them entirely in your own words. You must acknowledge that these thoughts are not your own by immediately citing the source in your paper. Failure to do this is plagiarism.
2. Borrow someone else's words (short phrases, clauses, or sentences), you must enclose the copied words in quotation marks as well as citing the source. Failure to do this is plagiarism.
3. Present someone else's paper or exam (stolen, borrowed, or bought) as your own. You have committed a clearly intentional form of intellectual theft and have put your academic future in jeopardy. This is the worst form of plagiarism.

Here is another explanation from the 2020, seventh edition of the Manual of The American Psychological Association (APA):

"Plagiarism is the act of presenting the words, idea, or images of another as your own; it denies authors or creators of content the credit they are due. Whether deliberate or unintentional, plagiarism violates ethical standards in scholarship" (p. 254). This same principle applies to the illicit use of AI.

Plagiarism: Researchers do not claim the words and ideas of another as their own; they give credit where credit is due. Quotations marks should be used to indicate the exact words of another. Each time you paraphrase another author (i.e., summarize a passage or rearrange the order of a sentence and change some of the words), you need to credit the source in the text. The key element of this principle is that authors do not present the work of another as if it were their own words. This can extend to ideas as well as written words. If authors model a study after one done by someone else, the originating author should be given credit. If the rationale for a study was suggested in the discussion section of someone else's article, the person should be given credit. Given the free exchange of ideas, which is very important for the health of intellectual discourse, authors may not know where an idea for a study originated. If authors do know, however, they should acknowledge the source; this includes personal communications (p. 11). For guidance on proper documentation, consult the Academic Success Center or a recommended guide to documentation and research such as the Manual of the APA or the MLA Handbook for Writers of Research Papers. If you still have doubts concerning proper documentation, seek advice from your instructor prior to submitting a final draft.

TAMUI has penalties for plagiarism and cheating.

- **Penalties for Plagiarism:** Should a faculty member discover that a student has committed plagiarism, the student should receive a grade of 'F' in that course and the matter will be referred to the Honor Council for possible disciplinary action. The faculty member, however, may elect to give freshmen and sophomore students a "zero" for the assignment and to allow them to revise the assignment up to a grade of "F" (50%) if they believe that the student plagiarized out of ignorance or carelessness and not out of an attempt to deceive in order to earn an unmerited grade; the instructor must still report the offense to the Honor Council. This option should not be available to juniors, seniors, or graduate students, who



cannot reasonably claim ignorance of documentation rules as an excuse. For repeat offenders in undergraduate courses or for an offender in any graduate course, the penalty for plagiarism is likely to include suspension or expulsion from the university.

- **Caution:** Be very careful what you upload to Turnitin or send to your professor for evaluation. Whatever you upload for evaluation will be considered your final, approved draft. If it is plagiarized, you will be held responsible. The excuse that “it was only a draft” will not be accepted.
- **Caution:** Also, do not share your electronic files with others. If you do, you are responsible for the possible consequences. If another student takes your file of a paper and changes the name to his or her name and submits it and you also submit the paper, we will hold both of you responsible for plagiarism. It is impossible for us to know with certainty who wrote the paper and who stole it. And, of course, we cannot know if there was collusion between you and the other student in the matter.
- **Penalties for Cheating:** Should a faculty member discover a student cheating on an exam or quiz or other class project, the student should receive a “zero” for the assignment and not be allowed to make the assignment up. The incident should be reported to the chair of the department and to the Honor Council. If the cheating is extensive, however, or if the assignment constitutes a major grade for the course (e.g., a final exam), or if the student has cheated in the past, the student should receive an “F” in the course, and the matter should be referred to the Honor Council. Additional penalties, including suspension or expulsion from the university may be imposed. Under no circumstances should a student who deserves an “F” in the course be allowed to withdraw from the course with a “W”
 - **Caution:** Chat groups that start off as “study groups” can easily devolve into “cheating groups.” Be very careful not to join or remain any chat group if it begins to discuss specific information about exams or assignments that are meant to require individual work. If you are a member of such a group and it begins to cheat, you will be held responsible along with all the other members of the group. The TAMIU Honor Code requires that you report any such instances of cheating.
- **Student Right of Appeal:** Faculty will notify students immediately via the student’s TAMIU e-mail account that they have submitted plagiarized work. Students have the right to appeal a faculty member’s charge of academic dishonesty by notifying the TAMIU Honor Council of their intent to appeal as long as the notification of appeal comes within 10 business days of the faculty member’s e-mail message to the student and/or the Office of Student Conduct and Community Engagement. The Student Handbook provides more details.

Use of Work in Two or More Courses

You may not submit work completed in one course for a grade in a second course unless you receive explicit permission to do so by the instructor of the second course. In general, you should get credit for a work product only once.

AI Policies

Copyright Restrictions

The Copyright Act of 1976 grants to copyright owners the exclusive right to reproduce their works and distribute copies of their work. Works that receive copyright protection include published works such as a textbook. Copying a textbook without permission from the owner of the copyright may constitute copyright infringement. Civil and criminal penalties may be assessed for copyright infringement. Civil penalties include damages up to \$100,000; criminal penalties include a fine up to \$250,000 and imprisonment. Copyright laws do not allow students and professors to make photocopies of copyrighted materials, but you may copy a limited portion of a work, such as article from a journal or a chapter from a book for your own personal academic use or, in the case of a professor, for personal, limited classroom use. In general, the extent of your copying should not suggest that the purpose or the effect of your copying is to avoid paying for the materials. And, of course, you may not sell these copies for a profit. Thus, students who copy textbooks to avoid buying them or professors who provide photocopies of textbooks to enable students to save money are violating the law.

Incompletes

Students who are unable to complete a course should withdraw from the course before the final date for withdrawal and receive a "W." To qualify for an "incomplete" and thus have the opportunity to complete the course at a later date, a student must meet the following criteria:

1. The student must have completed 90% of the course work assigned before the final date for withdrawing from a course with a "W", and the student must be passing the course;
2. The student cannot complete the course because an accident, an illness, or a traumatic personal or family event occurred after the final date for withdrawal from a course;
3. The student must sign an "Incomplete Grade Contract" and secure signatures of approval from the professor and the college dean.
4. The student must agree to complete the missing course work before the end of the next long semester; failure to meet this deadline will cause the "I" to automatically be converted to an "F"; extensions to this deadline may be granted by the dean of the college. This is the general policy regarding the circumstances under which an "incomplete" may be granted, but under exceptional circumstances, a student may receive an incomplete who does not meet all of the criteria above if the faculty member, department chair, and dean recommend it.

WIN Contracts

The Department of Biology and Chemistry does not permit WIN contracts. For other departments within the college, WIN Contracts are offered only under exceptional circumstances and are limited to graduating seniors. Only courses offered by full-time TAMIU faculty or TAMIU instructors are



eligible to be contracted for the WIN requirement. However, a WIN contract for a course taught by an adjunct may be approved, with special permission from the department chair and dean. Students must seek approval before beginning any work for the WIN Contract. No student will contract more than one course per semester. Summer WIN Contracts must continue through both summer sessions.

Student Responsibility for Dropping a Course

It is the responsibility of the student to drop the course before the final date for withdrawal from a course. Faculty members, in fact, may not drop a student from a course without getting the approval of their department chair and dean.

Independent Study Course

Independent Study (IS) courses are offered only under exceptional circumstances. Required courses intended to build academic skills may not be taken as IS (e.g., clinical supervision and internships). No student will take more than one IS course per semester. Moreover, IS courses are limited to seniors and graduate students. Summer IS course must continue through both summer sessions.

Grade Changes & Appeals

Faculty are authorized to change final grades only when they have committed a computational error or an error in recording a grade, and they must receive the approval of their department chairs and the dean to change the grade. As part of that approval, they must attach a detailed explanation of the reason for the mistake. Only in rare cases would another reason be entertained as legitimate for a grade change. A student who is unhappy with his or her grade on an assignment must discuss the situation with the faculty member teaching the course. If students believe that they have been graded unfairly, they have the right to appeal the grade using a grade appeal process in the Student Handbook and in the Faculty Handbook.

Final Examination

All courses in all colleges must include a comprehensive exam or performance and be given on the date and time specified by the Academic Calendar and the Final Exam schedule published by the Registrar's Office. In the College of Arts & Sciences all final exams must contain a written component. The written component should comprise at least 20% of the final exam grade. Exceptions to this policy must receive the approval of the department chair and the dean at the beginning of the semester.
