Course Description

This course is designed to provide students with an introduction to basic concepts and techniques necessary for a preliminary and proficient understanding of criminal justice research. Emphasis will be placed on analyzing and interpreting research findings using a standard statistical software package that includes descriptive statistics, inferential statistics, and bivariate analysis. Prerequisite: CRIJ 3301 or equivalent, with a grade of "C" or better, MATH 1314, and consent of COAS Advisor

Additional Course Information

Course Learning Philosophy

This course emphasizes understanding statistical concepts over rote memorization of formulas or software manipulation; statistical reasoning over button-pushing; interpretation over calculation; critical evaluation of both human- and AI-generated interpretations; and applying statistics to consume research rather than becoming statisticians. Students will identify basic concepts, select appropriate techniques to analyze data, accurately interpret statistical results, and communicate findings responsibly.

Artificial Intelligence (AI) and Statistical Reasoning:

Students will not use AI to complete assignments unless specified otherwise. AI can be used to facilitate understanding and problem-solving statistical methods and procedures. In-class activities and/or take-home assignments may require students to compare AI-generated interpretations with their own analyses and explain differences. Students may use AI tools for grammar and spelling correction, improving clarity of sentence structure and organization, generating or refining topic sentences, transition sentences, or outlines (as scaffolding, not final content), identifying possible structural improvements in drafts, and limited brainstorming for research questions or ideas to explore (not generating written content for submission). However, students are responsible for verifying all statistical procedures and interpretations, as well as the accuracy of AI-generated responses. An AI disclosure statement is mandatory on all submissions. Your submissions may be run through Blackboard Ultra's SafeAssign or Turnitin, which are used to identify and assess plagiarism. If at any time a student feels they need to use AI to complete an assignment, please talk to me, judgment-free. This allows us to work together to come up with a plan to complete the assignment with academic honesty and integrity.

Plagiarism



Plagiarism on any assignment will automatically result in a zero. Additionally, academic misconduct includes not only plagiarism, but also academic dishonesty and falsification. Please review the TAMIU Honor Code at the end of the syllabus for specific definitions, penalties, and reporting procedures.

3. Construct and Evaluate Data Visualizations: Create, interpret, and assess tables, graphs, and other data visualization methods used to present findings in criminology and criminal justice.
4. Conduct Statistical Analyses: Select, perform, and interpret univariate and bivariate statistical analyses using actual criminological data and research scenarios.
5. Demonstrate SPSS Proficiency: Exhibit foundational skills in data management and statistical analysis using SPSS software, including data entry, manipulation, and output generation.

Course Requirements and Grading Criteria

Due Dates and Times: All due dates and times are in Central Time. Regularly check the syllabus and class announcements for due dates, updates, and specific instructions related to assignments and activities.

Grading Components:

1. Class Participation and Discussion (150 points, 15% of total grade)

Class Attendance (50 points): Attendance is mandatory. Each class builds on the previous one, and we will develop statistical knowledge and software skills step by step. Attendance will be taken via Top Hat and/or a paper sign-in sheet each class day. Students are expected to arrive on time, stay for the entire class, and actively participate in discussions and demonstrations.

- Participation Points Breakdown:

- Participated in 23–26 sessions: 50 points
- Participated in 20–22 sessions: 40 points
- Participated in 18–19 sessions: 35 points
- Participated in 15–17 sessions: 30 points
- Participated in 13–14 sessions: 25 points
- Participated in fewer than 13 sessions: 20 points



- Note: There are no make-up opportunities for participation points except in cases of documented emergencies.

Discussion Board Assignments (100 points)

There will be five online discussion board assignments, with topics provided one week in advance. Students must submit an initial post and respond to one classmate's post by the deadlines.

- Requirements:

- Each post must be at least one full paragraph (minimum of 7 sentences).

- Originality is crucial; simple responses (e.g., "I agree") will receive a zero.

- Grading: Each discussion is worth 20 points and will assess both initial (10 points) and response posts (10 points). Instructions and rubrics will be provided on Blackboard.

2. In-Class Assignments (100 points, 10% of total grade)

- In-class activities may include readings, quizzes, problem-solving exercises (using SPSS or Excel), and reflection papers.

- There will be 12 in-class assignments, each worth 10 points (the two lowest scores will be dropped). Instructions and rubrics will be provided on Blackboard.

- Quizzes: Administered online via Blackboard, consisting of 5 to 10 questions from assigned readings.

- SPSS/Excel Assignments: In-class assignments will involve analyzing data and interpreting results.

- Hand Calculation Assignments: In-class assignments will involve hand calculations for some statistical measures. Partial marks may be awarded even if the answer is incorrect.

3. Take-Home Assignments (300 points, 30% of total grade)

- These group projects may include a scholarly article review and a data analysis project, submitted via Blackboard and presented in class.

One or more of these assignments may integrate an AI framework with five levels: "No AI", "AI Planning", "AI Collaboration", "Full AI", and "AI Exploration". Instructions and rubrics will be provided.

Assignment Breakdown:

- Assignment #1: Scholarly Article Review (50 points): Evaluate a quantitative, peer-reviewed journal article.

- Data Analysis Project (250 points): This includes multiple take-home assignments focusing on data analysis using SPSS.

- Assignment #2: Levels of Measurement and Variable Selection (50 points): Develop research questions and hypotheses based on a dataset.

- Assignment #3: Descriptive Analysis (100 points): Focus on descriptive statistics and compare AI-generated outputs with human interpretations.

- Assignment #4: Inferential Analysis (100 points): Focus on inferential statistics, similar to Assignment #3.

4. Examinations (450 points, 45% of total grade)

- Three exams (each worth 150 points, 15% of total grade) will be administered via Blackboard. While not strictly cumulative, earlier concepts will be necessary for understanding later material.

- Exam Format: May include multiple-choice, True/False, fill-in-the-blank, matching, short-answer, and essay questions.

- Make-Up Exams: If you cannot attend an exam, notify the instructor within 48 hours. Make-up exams are allowed only for documented emergencies and will be in essay format.

5. Extra Credit Activities

- Extra credit activities may be offered throughout the semester (e.g., annotated bibliography or data analysis plan). Total extra credit points will not exceed 20.

Required Class Attendance

Students are expected to attend every class in person (or virtually, if the class is online) and to complete all assignments. If you cannot attend class, it is your responsibility to communicate absences with your professors. The faculty member will decide if your excuse is valid and thus may provide lecture materials of the class. According to University policy, acceptable reasons for an absence, which cannot affect a student's grade, include:

- Participation in an authorized University activity.
- Death or major illness in a student's immediate family.
- Illness of a dependent family member.
- Participation in legal proceedings or administrative procedures that require a student's presence.
- Religious holy day.
- Illness that is too severe or contagious for the student to attend class.
- Required participation in military duties.
- Mandatory admission interviews for professional or graduate school which cannot be rescheduled.

Students are responsible for providing satisfactory evidence to faculty members within seven calendar days of their absence and return to class. They must substantiate the reason for the absence. If the absence is excused, faculty members must either provide students with the opportunity to make up the exam or other work missed, or provide a satisfactory alternative to complete the exam or other work missed within 30 calendar days from the date of absence. Students who miss class due to a University-sponsored activity are responsible for identifying their absences to their instructors with as much advance notice as possible.

Classroom Behavior (applies to online or Face-to-Face Classes)

In the classroom, students are expected to listen attentively, participate respectfully, and adhere to established rules. Behavior that interferes with the class lecture may result in disciplinary action, ensuring a productive and respectful learning environment for everyone. Any disputes over academic matters should be addressed calmly and constructively, ideally during designated times such as office hours or after class. If a student does not agree with a decision, they can request a meeting with the instructor to discuss their concerns in more detail. Should further resolution be needed, the

TAMIU Honor Code: Plagiarism and Cheating

As a TAMIU student, you are bound by the TAMIU Honor Code to conduct yourself ethically in all your activities as a TAMIU student and to report violations of the Honor Code. Please read carefully the Student Handbook Article 7 and Article 10 available at Student Handbook (<https://www.tamiau.edu/handbook/index.shtml>).

We are committed to strict enforcement of the Honor Code. Violations of the Honor Code tend to involve claiming work that is not one's own, most commonly plagiarism in written assignments and any form of cheating on exams and other types of assignments.

Plagiarism is the presentation of someone else's work as your own. It occurs when you:

1. Borrow someone else's facts, ideas, or opinions and put them entirely in your own words. You must acknowledge that these thoughts are not your own by immediately citing the source in your paper. Failure to do this is plagiarism.
2. Borrow someone else's words (short phrases, clauses, or sentences), you must enclose the copied words in quotation marks as well as citing the source. Failure to do this is plagiarism.
3. Present someone else's paper or exam (stolen, borrowed, or bought) as your own. You have committed a clearly intentional form of intellectual theft and have put your academic future in jeopardy. This is the worst form of plagiarism.

Here is another explanation from the 2020, seventh edition of the Manual of The American Psychological Association (APA):

"Plagiarism is the act of presenting the words, idea, or images of another as your own; it denies authors or creators of content the credit they are due. Whether deliberate or unintentional, plagiarism violates ethical standards in scholarship" (p. 254). This same principle applies to the illicit use of AI.

Plagiarism: Researchers do not claim the words and ideas of another as their own; they give credit where credit is due. Quotations marks should be used to indicate the exact words of another. Each time you paraphrase another author (i.e., summarize a passage or rearrange the order of a sentence and change some of the words), you need to credit the source in the text. The key element of this principle is that authors do not present the work of another as if it were their own words. This can extend to ideas as well as written words. If authors model a study after one done by someone else, the originating author should be given credit. If the rationale for a study was suggested in the discussion section of someone else's article, the person should be given credit. Given the free exchange of ideas, which is very important for the health of intellectual discourse, authors may not know where an idea for a study originated. If authors do know, however, they should acknowledge the source; this includes personal communications (p. 11). For guidance on proper documentation, consult the Academic Success Center or a recommended guide to documentation and research such as the Manual of the APA or the MLA Handbook for Writers of Research Papers. If you still have doubts concerning proper documentation, seek advice from your instructor prior to submitting a final draft.

TAMIU has penalties for plagiarism and cheating.

- **Penalties for Plagiarism:** Should a faculty member discover that a student has committed plagiarism, the student should receive a grade of 'F' in that course and the matter will be referred to the Honor Council for possible disciplinary action. The faculty member, however, may elect to give freshmen and sophomore students a "zero" for the assignment and to allow them to revise the assignment up to a grade of "F" (50%) if they believe that the student plagiarized out of ignorance or carelessness and not out of an attempt to deceive in order to earn an unmerited grade; the instructor must still report the offense to the Honor Council. This option should not be available to juniors, seniors, or graduate students, who cannot reasonably claim ignorance of documentation rules as an excuse. For repeat offenders in undergraduate courses or for an offender in any graduate course, the penalty for plagiarism is likely to include suspension or expulsion from the university.
 - **Caution:** Be very careful what you upload to Turnitin or send to your professor for evaluation. Whatever you upload for evaluation will be considered your final, approved draft. If it is plagiarized, you will be held responsible. The excuse that "it was only a draft" will not be accepted.
 - **Caution:** Also, do not share your electronic files with others. If you do, you are responsible for the possible consequences. If another student takes your file of a paper and changes the name to his or her name and submits it and you also submit the paper, we will hold both of you responsible for plagiarism. It is impossible for us to know with certainty who wrote the paper and who stole it. And, of course, we cannot know if there was collusion between you and the other student in the matter.
- **Penalties for Cheating:** Should a faculty member discover a student cheating on an exam or quiz or other class project, the student should receive a "zero" for the assignment and not be allowed to make the assignment up. The incident should be reported to the chair of the department and to the Honor Council. If the cheating is extensive, however, or if the assignment constitutes a major grade for the course (e.g., a final exam), or if the student has cheated in the past, the student should receive an "F" in the course, and the matter should be referred to the Honor Council. Additional penalties, including suspension or expulsion from the university may be imposed. Under no circumstances should a student who deserves an "F" in the course be allowed to withdraw from the course with a "W."
 - **Caution:** Chat groups that start off as "study groups" can easily devolve into "cheating groups." Be very careful not to join or remain any chat group if it begins to discuss specific information about exams or assignments that are meant to require individual work. If you are a member of such a group and it begins to cheat, you will be held responsible along with all the other members of the group. The TAMIU Honor Code requires that you report any such instances of cheating.

- **Student Right of Appeal:** Faculty will notify students immediately via the student's TAMIU e-mail account that they have submitted plagiarized work. Students have the right to appeal a faculty member's charge of academic dishonesty by notifying the TAMIU Honor Council of their intent to appeal as long as the notification of appeal comes within 10 business days of the faculty member's e-mail message to the student and/or the Office of Student Conduct and Community Engagement. The Student Handbook provides more details.

Use of Work in Two or More Courses

You may not submit work completed in one course for a grade in a second course unless you receive explicit permission to do so by the instructor of the second course. In general, you should get credit for a work product only once.

AI Policies

Your instructor will provide you with their personal policy on the use of AI in the classroom setting and associated coursework.

TAMIU E-Mail and SafeZone

Civil and criminal penalties may be assessed for copyright infringement. Civil penalties include damages up to \$100,000; criminal penalties include a fine up to \$250,000 and imprisonment. Copyright laws do not allow students and professors to make photocopies of copyrighted materials, but you may copy a limited portion of a work, such as article from a journal or a chapter from a book for your own personal academic use or, in the case of a professor, for personal, limited classroom use. In general, the extent of your copying should not suggest that the purpose or the effect of your copying is to avoid paying for the materials. And, of course, you may not sell these copies for a profit. Thus, students who copy textbooks to avoid buying them or professors who provide photocopies of textbooks to enable students to save money are violating the law.

Students with Disabilities

Texas A&M International University seeks to provide reasonable accommodations for all qualified persons with disabilities. This University will adhere to all applicable federal, state, and local laws, regulations and guidelines with respect to providing reasonable accommodations as required to afford equal education opportunity. It is the student's responsibility to register with the Office of Disability Services for Students located in Student Center 124. This office will contact the faculty member to recommend specific, reasonable accommodations. Faculty are prohibited from making accommodations based solely on communications from students. They may make accommodations only when provided documentation by the Office of Disability Services for Students.

Pregnant and Parenting Students

Under Title IX of the Education Amendments of 1972, harassment based on sex, including harassment because of pregnancy or related conditions, is prohibited. A pregnant/parenting student must be granted an absence for as long as the student's physician deems the absence medically necessary. It is a violation of Title IX to ask for documentation relative to the pregnant/parenting student's status beyond what would be required for other medical conditions. TAMIU advises a pregnant/parenting student to notify their professor once the student is aware that accommodations for such will be necessary. Incompletes

Students who are unable to complete a course should withdraw from the course before the final date for withdrawal and receive a "W." To qualify for an "incomplete" and thus have the opportunity to complete the course at a later date, a student must meet the following criteria:

1. The student must have completed 90% of the course work assigned before the final date for withdrawing from a course with a "W", and the student must be passing the course;
2. The student cannot complete the course because an accident, an illness, or a traumatic personal or family event occurred after the final date for withdrawal from a course;
3. The student must sign an "Incomplete Grade Contract" and secure signatures of approval from the professor and the college dean.
4. The student must agree to complete the missing course work before the end of the next long semester; failure to meet this deadline will cause the "I" to automatically be converted to an "F"; extensions to this deadline may be granted by the dean of the college. This is the general policy regarding the circumstances under which an "incomplete" may be granted, but under exceptional circumstances, a student may receive an incomplete who does not meet all of the criteria above if the faculty member, department chair, and dean recommend it.

WIN Contracts

The Department of Biology and Chemistry does not permit WIN contracts. For other departments within the college, WIN Contracts are offered only under exceptional circumstances and are limited to graduating seniors. Only courses offered by full-time TAMIU faculty or TAMIU instructors are eligible to be contracted for the WIN requirement. However, a WIN contract for a course taught by an adjunct may be approved, with special permission from the department chair and dean. Students must seek approval before beginning any work for the WIN Contract. No student will contract more than one course per semester. Summer WIN Contracts must continue through both summer sessions.

Student Responsibility for Dropping a Course

It is the responsibility of the student to drop the course before the final date for withdrawal from a course. Faculty members, in fact, may not drop a student from a course without getting the approval of their department chair and dean.

Independent Study Course

Independent Study (IS) courses are offered only under exceptional circumstances. Required courses intended to build academic skills may not be taken as IS (e.g., clinical supervision and internships). No student will take more than one IS course per semester. Moreover, IS courses are limited to seniors and graduate students. Summer IS course must continue through both summer sessions.

Grade Changes & Appeals

Faculty are authorized to change final grades only when they have committed a computational error or an error in recording a grade, and they must receive the approval of their department chairs and the dean to change the grade. As part of that approval, they must attach a detailed explanation of the reason for the mistake. Only in rare cases would another reason be entertained as legitimate for a grade change. A student who is unhappy with



his or her grade on an assignment must discuss the situation with the faculty member teaching the course. If students believe that they have been graded unfairly, they have the right to appeal the grade using a grade appeal process in the Student Handbook and in the Faculty Handbook.

Final Examination

All courses in all colleges must include a comprehensive exam or performance and be given on the date and time specified by the Academic Calendar and the Final Exam schedule published by the Registrar's Office. In the College of Arts & Sciences all final exams must contain a written component. The written component should comprise at least 20% of the final exam grade. Exceptions to this policy must receive the approval of the department chair and the dean at the beginning of the semester.
