Course Structure

Teaching Methodology:

This course was designed to be fully online; ergo, you must have the self-study discipline to complete this course. This course requires reading and completing several activities on a weekly basis; reading and understanding the chapters is crucial to later applying the concepts to a real case.



Discussion forums will help you to understand much better the operational part for different types of businesses; it is like having specific experience from different firms operating in different industries. During this course, you are going to be exposed to understanding and assimilating the concepts read from the textbooks, and at the same time, develop the application into a multinational public firm traded in financial markets.

General expectations and responsibility for this course:

Online courses require several skills from the student, because almost everything will be conducted remotely, and students must have honesty, self-motivation, care, duty, and the ability to use technology to enhance the learning experience.

This course is mixed with qualitative and quantitative use of information compared with most of the graduate courses, ergo, students must have the ability to understand not only the concept, but also it requires almost every module to see the application using real-world business cases. Reading the modules every week, seeing the assigned videos, and completing the case reports are some of the major responsibilities for the student during this course.

You must produce one business case report or discussion forum related to your case company. Also, discussion forums will help you to not only see your own business case questions, but also to understand the material using different cases and businesses (learning from your colleagues) out there that will reinforce your learning experience.

Each student will work with a different business case during the semester, ergo you will be exposed to almost all industries and types of firms when you interact using discussion forums.

Finally, exams are going to be related to the application of some concepts using real financial data from your firm. For your exams, you will need Respondus Monitor software. More information is available under the exam weeks, inside the main menu content in Blackboard.

Program Learning Outcomes

Course Goal

This course provides a comprehensive macroeconomic study of exchange rate determination, using exchange rate mechanisms and tools in the currency markets; it also explores the international parity relationship to be able to forecast exchange rates and ergo risk currency exposure. Finally, this course studies how firms use leverage in different currencies to cover operations and use hedging across the world.

Curriculum Objectives Targeted:

Exhibit competency in the basic knowledge of how international finance in organizations operating in different countries helps to improve operations, reduce costs, enhance efficiency, and promote a better strategic position.

Discuss why a firm has decided to operate in different countries and the relationship between labor, materials, and the cost of financing sources.

Interpret the importance of interest rates, exchange rates, international financial markets, and trade for a multinational firm.

Activities

Exams (2 Exams Total) 70%/2 exam equals 35 % of each exam.

Case Reports (2 Reports Total) 20% / 2 case reports equal 10.0 % each.

Discussion Forum (2 Total) 10% / 2 Discussion forums equal 5.0 % each.

The assessment process for this course will be divided into 2 exams, 2 weekly case reports, and 2 discussion forums.

***For example, if you have average 75%, 90%, and 70% respectively in all exams, all case reports, and all discussion forums, then your cumulative grade will be $(70\% \times 75) + (20\% \times 90) + (10\% \times 70) = 77.5\%$ which is a grade of a “C”.**



All averages will be the arithmetic average for all seven weeks for cases, exams, and forums. For example, if you have in your exams 95 and 85, then your cumulative average will be 90.

- Exams will be scheduled in advance, and exams will be available in a window form, having 2-3 days open 24/7, remember all hours in this course are in Central Standard Time. Exams will be open-ended or multiple-choice questions, and it will be required to know the material covered during the previous weeks. It is going to be required to have a calculator to perform some calculations. All answers will be graded according to the material, and all answers count the same. For example, if the exam requires 30 questions or problems to answer, each answer will count 100% of the full grade divided by 30 questions, which is equal to 3.334% out of 100%. The time required in each exam will vary because it will be necessary to answer open questions in some cases, but you should expect to block at minimum 120 minutes of your time. Once you start the exam, it cannot be paused or aborted; you must finish the exam. Exam results are going to be released within 48 hours after the due date. See the Exam Instructions in the course to know exactly the chapters that are covered for each exam.
- This is an online course, ergo it requires connectivity and a stable network connection. Please be sure you plan ahead before you take the exam, to avoid any problems regarding system failure, network errors, or any other problem during the exam. For your exams, you will need Respondus Monitor software. More information is available under the exam weeks, inside the main menu content in Blackboard.

Open Boilerplate

Case Reports description: All case reports are individual. You will be assigned to one public firm traded in one of the major financial markets. Below are the instructions:

- You will be assigned to one public firm during the semester.
- You must visit the company's official web page to download the latest 3 SEC Filings 10K Reports. You must download the pdf's files from the last 3 years.
- Inside the SEC 10K Annual reports, you must read the sections related to Part 1. Business Descriptions and Risk Factors. Part 2. Selected Financial Data and Management's Discussion and Analysis. Part 4. Financial statements and notes to the consolidated financial statements.
- You will be required to provide economic data for 3 different countries.

Each case report will be turned in using the designated drop box. The drop box will be closed during the designated week after Sunday at 11:59 p.m. CT. Case reports are going to be graded within 48 hours after the due date. I do not accept late work; late work is graded with ZERO.

All files of Weekly Case Reports must pass the SAFE ASSIGN TOOL NO MORE THAN 10% ORIGINALITY SCORE. Visit the following page if you need to learn more about the Safe Assign Tool <http://www.tamui.edu/distance/students/elearning-orientation.shtml> or contact the eLearning team at elearning@tamui.edu. Your report must pass the originality report with a score lower than 10%. If your file is above the 10% limit, you can modify and resubmit the file until you reach the maximum 10%. You cannot copy sections from your previous reports or use paragraphs from your previous case reports. Each case report is completely different. If your case report is above the 10% originality score maximum accepted level, your grade will be zero. Please avoid any additional complaints if you have above 10% and then receive a zero grade in your weekly report. You will have the opportunity to reduce your originality score as long as the drop box is open; sometimes it will be required to submit the file several times to reach below the 10% permitted. No late submissions are accepted. Late work equals zero. The rubric will be included in Blackboard.

Discussion Forums: All discussion forums are different, so you cannot copy or use sections from your case reports to make your discussion forums. One way to enhance the learning experience is by using discussion forums, for example, if you know the importance of interest rates and currencies in your case firm in terms of relative importance, or in terms of countries, and then you want to know these variables with other firms within the industry (competitors) or with different sectors. You will be able to ask your colleagues because they are going to have different firms within the sector or in different sectors. Discussion forums simulate a classroom experience and will require you to share your experience and knowledge from your case firm with your colleagues. We are going to have discussion questions, and your professor can enhance the discussion using additional real case examples. You will be required to answer the question from your own company, but you will also need to comment on at least two of your colleagues' answers every week.

Please post your initial response (first post) by Wednesday, no later than 11:59 p.m. CT of the corresponding week, and comment on the posts of two classmates by Friday, no later than 11:59 p.m. CT of that same week.



Mechanics of the Discussion Forum. We are going to explore some Questions per Week (Module) and two comments in two different cases (or colleagues) per Module (Week). Questions are related to your own semester case company and the countries where the firm operates. See below the questions that we are going to explore every week.

For all the questions below, we assume that your firm is a US-based firm with business operations outside the US.

Discussion 1 (3 questions)

1. Identify how your firm produces cash flows, using trade, licensing, franchising, joint ventures, or foreign investments, then describe the implications of the Balance of Payments for the US as a result of this relationship. For example, if your firm earns cash flows from Mexico due to franchising, what would be the implications for the US Balance of Payments?
1. Identify the countries and the currencies where your firm operates and has business relationships, then describe in which international financial markets your firm should have operations. Select at least two countries where you can describe the inflation and interest rates, which will help you to calculate the exchange rates for these two countries.
1. One tool to manage risk inside the organization is the use of derivatives. Reading the SEC10K (section notes to the consolidated statements) describes the type of derivatives and the reasons for use. Describe which particular currencies your firm is using to hedge.

Discussion 2 (4 Questions)

- 1-Identify how your firm can produce triangular arbitrage using the previous answers, and identify how these currencies are affected by the PPP and IFE theories.
- 2-Describe in which currencies your firm is probably forecasting exchange rates, support your answer with the type of operations and investments your firm is related to different currencies, and describe the type of forecasting your firm is probably using.
- 3-Describe the list of different debentures that your firm is exposed also describe the currencies related. See SEC10K sections notes to the consolidated financials.
- 4-Describe how your firm uses Fintech in its daily operations. If not, explain at least 3 different areas where your company can benefit from using Fintech.

Required Class Attendance

Students are expected to attend every class in person (or virtually, if the class is online) and to complete all assignments. If you cannot attend class, it is your responsibility to communicate absences with your professors. The faculty member will decide if your excuse is valid and thus may provide lecture materials of the class. According to University policy, acceptable reasons for an absence, which cannot affect a student's grade, include:

- Participation in an authorized University activity.

- Illness of a dependent family member.
- Participation in legal proceedings or administrative procedures that require a student's presence.

Students are responsible for providing satisfactory evidence to faculty members within seven calendar days of their absence and return to class. They must substantiate the reason for the absence. If the absence is excused, faculty members must either provide students with the opportunity to make up the exam or other work missed, or provide a satisfactory alternative to complete the exam or other work missed within 30 calendar days from the date of absence. Students who miss class due to a University-sponsored activity are responsible for identifying their absences to their instructors with as much advance notice as possible.

Classroom Behavior (applies to online or Face-to-Face Classes)

TAMU Honor Code: Plagiarism and Cheating

As a TAMU student, you are bound by the TAMU Honor Code to conduct yourself ethically in all your activities as a TAMU student and to report violations of the Honor Code. Please read carefully the Student Handbook Article 7 and Article 10 available at Student Handbook (<https://www.tamtu.edu/handbook/index.shtml>).

We are committed to strict enforcement of the Honor Code. Violations of the Honor Code tend to involve claiming work that is not one's own, most commonly plagiarism in written assignments and any form of cheating on exams and other types of assignments.

Plagiarism is the presentation of someone else's work as your own. It occurs when you:

1. Borrow someone else's facts, ideas, or opinions and put them entirely in your own words. You must acknowledge that these thoughts are not your own by immediately citing the source in your paper. Failure to do this is plagiarism.
2. Borrow someone else's words (short phrases, clauses, or sentences), you must enclose the copied words in quotation marks as well as citing the source. Failure to do this is plagiarism.
3. Present someone else's paper or exam (stolen, borrowed, or bought) as your own. You have committed a clearly intentional form of intellectual theft and have put your academic future in jeopardy. This is the worst form of plagiarism.

Here is another explanation from the 2020, seventh edition of the Manual of The American Psychological Association (APA):

"Plagiarism is the act of presenting the words, idea, or images of another as your own; it denies authors or creators of content the credit they are due. Whether deliberate or unintentional, plagiarism violates ethical standards in scholarship" (p. 254). This same principle applies to the illicit use of AI.

Plagiarism: Researchers do not claim the words and ideas of another as their own; they give credit where credit is due. Quotations marks should be used to indicate the exact words of another. Each time you paraphrase another author (i.e., summarize a passage or rearrange the order of a sentence and change some of the words), you need to credit the source in the text. The key element of this principle is that authors do not present the work of another as if it were their own words. This can extend to ideas as well as written words. If authors model a study after one done by someone else, the originating author should be given credit. If the rationale for a study was suggested in the discussion section of someone else's article, the person should be given credit. Given the free exchange of ideas, which is very important for the health of intellectual discourse, authors may not know where an idea for a study originated. If authors do know, however, they should acknowledge the source; this includes personal communications (p. 11). For guidance on proper documentation, consult the Academic Success Center or a recommended guide to documentation and research such as the Manual of the APA or the MLA Handbook for Writers of Research Papers. If you still have doubts concerning proper documentation, seek advice from your instructor prior to submitting a final draft.

TAMIU has penalties for plagiarism and cheating.

- **Penalties for Plagiarism:** Should a faculty member discover that a student has committed plagiarism, the student should receive a grade of 'F' in that course and the matter will be referred to the Honor Council for possible disciplinary action. The faculty member, however, may elect to give freshmen and sophomore students a "zero" for the assignment and to allow them to revise the assignment up to a grade of "F" (50%) if they believe that the student plagiarized out of ignorance or carelessness and not out of an attempt to deceive in order to earn an unmerited grade; the instructor must still report the offense to the Honor Council. This option should not be available to juniors, seniors, or graduate students, who cannot reasonably claim ignorance of documentation rules as an excuse. For repeat offenders in undergraduate courses or for an offender in any graduate course, the penalty for plagiarism is likely to include suspension or expulsion from the university.
 - **Caution:** Be very careful what you upload to Turnitin or send to your professor for evaluation. Whatever you upload for evaluation will be considered your final, approved draft. If it is plagiarized, you will be held responsible. The excuse that "it was only a draft" will not be accepted.
 - **Caution:** Also, do not share your electronic files with others. If you do, you are responsible for the possible consequences. If another student takes your file of a paper and changes the name to his or her name and submits it and you also submit the paper, we will hold both of you responsible for plagiarism. It is impossible for us to know with certainty who wrote the paper and who stole it. And, of course, we cannot know if there was collusion between you and the other student in the matter.
- **Penalties for Cheating:** Should a faculty member discover a student cheating on an exam or quiz or other class project, the student should receive a "zero" for the assignment and not be allowed to make the assignment up. The incident should be reported to the chair of the department and to the Honor Council. If the cheating is extensive, however, or if the assignment constitutes a major grade for the course (e.g., a final exam), or if the student has cheated in the past, the student should receive an "F" in the course, and the matter should be referred to the Honor Council. Additional penalties, including suspension or expulsion from the university may be imposed. Under no circumstances should a student who deserves an "F" in the course be allowed to withdraw from the course with a "W."
 - **Caution:** Chat groups that start off as "study groups" can easily devolve into "cheating groups." Be very careful not to join or remain any chat group if it begins to discuss specific information about exams or assignments that are meant to require individual work. If you are a member of such a group and it begins to cheat, you will be held responsible along with all the other members of the group. The TAMIU Honor Code requires that you report any such instances of cheating.
- **Student Right of Appeal:** Faculty will notify students immediately via the student's TAMIU e-mail account that they have submitted plagiarized work. Students have the right to appeal a faculty member's charge of academic dishonesty by notifying the TAMIU Honor Council of their intent to appeal as long as the notification of appeal comes within 10 business days of the faculty member's e-mail message to the student and/or the Office of Student Conduct and Community Engagement. The Student Handbook provides more details.

Use of Work in Two or More Courses

Copyright Restrictions

The Copyright Act of 1976 grants to copyright owners the exclusive right to reproduce their works and distribute copies of their work. Works that receive copyright protection include published works such as a textbook. Copying a textbook without permission from the owner of the copyright may constitute copyright infringement. Civil and criminal penalties may be assessed for copyright infringement. Civil penalties include damages up to \$100,000; criminal penalties include a fine up to \$250,000 and imprisonment. Copyright laws do not allow students and professors to make photocopies of copyrighted materials, but you may copy a limited portion of a work, such as article from a journal or a chapter from a book for your own personal academic use or, in the case of a professor, for personal, limited classroom use. Incompletes

Students who are unable to complete a course should withdraw from the course before the final date for withdrawal and receive a "W." To qualify for an "incomplete" and thus have the opportunity to complete the course at a later date, a student must meet the following criteria:

1. The student must have completed 90% of the course work assigned before the final date for withdrawing from a course with a "W", and the student must be passing the course;
2. The student cannot complete the course because an accident, an illness, or a traumatic personal or family event occurred after the final date for withdrawal from a course;
3. The student must sign an "Incomplete Grade Contract" and secure signatures of approval from the professor and the college dean.
4. The student must agree to complete the missing course work before the end of the next long semester; failure to meet this deadline will cause the "I" to automatically be converted to an "F"; extensions to this deadline may be granted by the dean of the college. This is the general policy regarding the circumstances under which an "incomplete" may be granted, but under exceptional circumstances, a student may receive an incomplete who does not meet all of the criteria above if the faculty member, department chair, and dean recommend it.

WIN Contracts

The Department of Biology and Chemistry does not permit WIN contracts. For other departments within the college, WIN Contracts are offered only under exceptional circumstances and are limited to graduating seniors. Only courses offered by full-time TAMIU faculty or TAMIU instructors are eligible to be contracted for the WIN requirement. However, a WIN contract for a course taught by an adjunct may be approved, with special permission from the department chair and dean. Students must seek approval before beginning any work for the WIN Contract. No student will contract more than one course per semester. Summer WIN Contracts must continue through both summer sessions.

Student Responsibility for Dropping a Course

It is the responsibility of the student to drop the course before the final date for withdrawal from a course. Faculty members, in fact, may not drop a student from a course without getting the approval of their department chair and dean.

Independent Study Course

Independent Study (IS) courses are offered only under exceptional circumstances. Required courses intended to build academic skills may not be taken as IS (e.g., clinical supervision and internships). No student will take more than one IS course per semester. Moreover, IS courses are limited to seniors and graduate students. Summer IS course must continue through both summer sessions.

Grade Changes & Appeals

Faculty are authorized to change final grades only when they have committed a computational error or an error in recording a grade, and they must receive the approval of their department chairs and the dean to change the grade. As part of that approval, they must attach a detailed explanation of the reason for the mistake. Only in rare cases would another reason be entertained as legitimate for a grade change. A student who is unhappy with his or her grade on an assignment must discuss the situation with the faculty member teaching the course. If students believe that they have been graded unfairly, they have the right to appeal the grade using a grade appeal process in the Student Handbook and in the Faculty Handbook.

Final Examination

All courses in all colleges must include a comprehensive exam or performance and be given on the date and time specified by the Academic Calendar and the Final Exam schedule published by the Registrar's Office. In the College of Arts & Sciences all final exams must contain a written component. The written component should comprise at least 20% of the final exam grade. Exceptions to this policy must receive the approval of the department chair and the dean at the beginning of the semester.

- **100-Percent Online Course** - A distance education course in which 100 percent of instructional activity takes place when the student(s) and instructor(s) are in separate physical locations. **Requirements for on-campus or in-person orientation, testing, academic support services, internships/fieldwork, or other non-instructional activities do not exclude a course from this category.**
